 1. 1891 Plat and 1912 Sanborn Maps were used as baselines for building locations. They are available for viewing at the Nauvoo Historical Society's Weld House Museum, 1380 Mulholland. It is obvious from the 1891 Plat and the 1912 Sanborn Map that a saloon was at this location. There is little information regarding all the saloons' names nor their owners/ proprietors.

However, it is possible that Ed Argast ran "Ed's Saloon" here until 1898. Jake Boyer was here in the latter teens, and early 1920's before the saloon was closed by Prohibition's Volstead Act in 1921.

Circa the 1920's, however, E.J. Diemer operated "Diemer Motor Company," a Ford dealership and garage, as well as a Shell Gas Station at this location. Steve Kelly bought the dealership from Diemer somewhere between 1949-1951; Leo Gasaway ran the garage. The Ford dealership burned in the late 1960's. Gasaway's garage remained until the mid 1960's.

From a confectionary to a grocery store to a tavern, the businesses at 1310 Mulholland ran the gamut. Circa 1915, Ed Becker and wife operated a confectionary store here followed by C. "Steinmetz's Bakery" and Titus "T.J." Henderson's "Home Bakery" (1930-32).

It changed to a grocery store in the mid 1930's when it became O.E. Daugherty's "Clover Farm Store" (one of several of Daugherty's locations in Nauvoo over the years). Paul and Lucille Harsch followed with "Harsch's Meat Market c. 1928 to the early 1950's. They lived upstairs of the business. (The Harsch's had had a meat market in the Walter Building next door for a time, as well.)

The late 1960's began a series of taverns in the building. It was "Bunch and Jim's Tavern" when Joseph "Bunch" Bossler and Jim Schafer were owner/operators through the 1970's. After Bunch and Jim parted ways, Bunch and wife Milly ran the tavern. Later, 1977-79, Gene Pezley operated the tavern for Bunch. The building burned in 1983 or 1984.
