

"Unity" in Community

What follows was quoted at the June21 Mayor's Round Table meeting. It was taken from the 2012 Smithsonian-sponsored *Journey Stories* panel in the tourism office and written by committee members. It is relevant in Nauvoo today.

The history of our country is filled with waves of immigrants, each with their own traditions and cultures. The histories of New York, Boston, and even Chicago reveal clashes between peoples and cultures and the struggle to learn to live side by side.

The history of Nauvoo is no different. Groups of people came to Nauvoo, stayed for a while, and then some left. Those who moved on left evidence that they lived in and called Nauvoo home. Each of these groups had its own ideas about life. Religious and cultural differences caused conflict among area residents, and this led to violence in the 19th century.

Today, these differences still exist in Nauvoo, but we are choosing a different path and finding unity despite our differences. Through the creation of Journey Stories, we have come together to learn and tell each other's stories. Through this process, we have come to understand that there is strength in community. In our diversity, Latter Day Saints of several varieties, Icarian descendants, Germans, Catholics, Lutherans, Methodists, Presbyterians, agnostics, atheists, and more, we are Nauvoo.

Sidewalk Saga

Connectivity is the name of the game in this day and age, and Nauvoo is now connected via sidewalks. Getting them was no small feat.

Nauvoo's 2010 Streetscape committee was the impetus for getting the sidewalks along Mulholland and Hwy. 96. Stimulus and Enhancement Grants for local communities were available to towns who wanted to upgrade the safety, appearance, and convenience to drivers and pedestrians. The grant was written, and Nauvoo was one of the grantees.

Then, in 2013, the Nature Trail committee requested and received a Scenic Byway grant for the sidewalks along Water Street from the Stone Arch Bridge on Hwy 96 to Parley to enhance the Nature Trail (aka Nauvoo Riverwalk).

The sidewalks were implemented in two phases. Both grants were state and federally funded 80:20 with Nauvoo responsible for 20% of the cost. Besides the city, Nauvoo's Chamber of Commerce and Nauvoo Management (NRI) helped fulfill this commitment. Now, seven years later, the sidewalks are finally in place. And Nauvoo is now fully connected with pedestrian access in all directions from the business district to the historic sites on the flats. As it turns out, these were projects well worth the wait.



Cruisin' for Kids Annual Cruise Night

On Friday, June 30th, Michael McCarty and friends will be hosting the 5th Annual Cruisin' for the Kids Cruise Night in Nauvoo. The event will start at 5 p.m. in the upper level of the Nauvoo Parking garage, located on the corner of Mulholland and Bluff Streets.

Entry to the cruise night is free and is open to all ages. The cruise night will feature a special area for entrants younger than 21 years of age. To further highlight young entrants, a special award will be handed out to that age group. Other prizes, awards and activities will be offered.

This event is being planned to raise awareness for the Festival on Wheels/Tom Ciolek Scholarship Fund and to help to

build an interest in the world of hot rods. The money used for the annual scholarship comes from an auction of hand painted and pinstriped art that is held at the Festival on Wheels Car Show on Labor Day weekend. The unique art is produced by several artists that display their talents at the Labor Day weekend event. The Festival on Wheels Car Show is one of the largest open air car shows in the area.

- Approved request from Joe and Jennifer Smith to block off a section
 of Pecan Lane from the corner of Pecan and Riverview Drive to the
 end of their property line on June 24 from 2-8 p.m.. This is for a
 wedding reception in their back yard at 68 Riverview Drive, so that
 the food and decorations are protected from dust by vehicular traffic
 on the dirt road.
- Approved the purchase of Radio Read Meters for water usage at a cost of \$30,000, to be phased in over 3-4 years.
- Approved the purchase of an in-car camera costing \$5,000 and receiving \$500 for trading in the old camera.
- Approved the purchase of a hand-held radar unit costing \$866 to replace the 20-year-old one.
- Approved placing the city code online, a \$1,000 one-time fee and \$500 per year (\$250 in 2017).
- Renewed membership with Hancock County Economic Development Committee.
- Approved city assistance with new entrance to the fire department off Mulholland, covering the engineering and possibly replacing the culvert, at a cost of \$2,000, using TIF funds, if possible.
- Approved Barton Golding's resignation as a member of the Hotel/ Motel Tax Governing Board committee.
- Approved building permits of under \$5,000 for (1) Alan and Dianna Moberly, 445 S. Gordon, basement egress window.(2) John and Connie McCarty, 1775 Young Street, add 3' to existing deck.

And she was a whiz at finding things in the card catalog.

Some might think that libraries and librarians are irrelevant in this day and age. Why go to a library to search for information when computers and phones can answer our questions in only a few button presses.

Today's librarians, however, are technologically savvy and know how to navigate the internet to find information on just about anything—or, they know whom to ask. They do everything from signing up those in need for programs that facilitate anything from blindness (Talking Books) to college students who need test supervision at an offsite location. Librarians show patrons how to browse through old newspapers on microfilm, to read books on Kindles, to find and help patrons access tax forms, flyers and pamphlets on various services from medical centers to affordable food to disease prevention and awareness programs, and so much more.

In short, today's librarian is an invaluable resource person in a community—especially in small communities. The library is a hub for the exchange and acquisition of knowledge as well as a place that offers services and programs for the benefit of the whole community. It is a place that seeks to keep up with the changing times to help ease the transition for others.





Stephanie Shaw, Children's Workshop proprietor, and her husband Aaron and their five children have lived in Nauvoo for almost four years. The last three have found her in her delightful shop filled with things that tempt the young at heart-but mostly children- to stay and make things all day.

Stephanie, a former teacher of French in a Montessori

school in Washington, decided that Nauvoo needed a place for children to have a hands-on learning experience. For a \$5 fee for each activity, children can roll and dip beeswax candles, make a leather bracelet, or create a pottery item, The shop also has items for children to play with and learn from, as well as offers home-made items for sale: goat milk and honey soap, leather book jackets, and wood burned items, among others. To top it off, Stephanie's originally from France and offers French classes during the school year. She also bakes and sells French pastries and bread along with other French treats.

The Children's Workshop is on Mulholland across from the old grade school. It is open Thursday through Saturday from 12:30-6:00 p.m.. Mondays will find Stephanie selling her baked goods and soaps at the farmer's market in Fort Madison and in Montrose on Tuesdays. Yum! Stop in and try some!

Tri-State Counties Join Forces
