'Tis the Season for Severe Weather: What You Need to Know

There are five sirens in the following areas in Nauvoo: fire station, Lutheran church, Bluff Woods, pageant, North Hill. Sirens are activated by local officials at the fire department for both weather and non-weather emergencies: tornado, hail and severe storm, hazmat incident, terrorist threat, etc. - all of which require that you take action immediately.

Upon hearing outdoor warning sirens, it is important to go inside and tune into local media for more information. Then, listen and time the intervals between siren's blasts. The first blast will be sounded for one minute and re-sounded for one minute **for the duration of the threat** every five minutes. **There will be no "all clear" signal from outdoor warning sirens; local media should be consulted.** These sirens are tested the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m., with few exceptions.

Most fatalities during tornadoes or severe thunderstorms occur due to falling trees or large branches (usually in excess of 70 mph). Golf ball sized hail - or larger - also poses a threat to person and property. Should you need shelter while in the uptown area, go to the lower level of the parking garage on Mulholland and Bluff.

Nauvoo City Council News July 11, 2017

- Approved 3rd Reading of Ordinance 2017-1, the FY 2018 Appropriation Ordinance.
- Tabled action on Ruth Martin request--a one-month extension of the present agreement for the use of Suite 140 at the old grade school building to store merchandise.
- The EDC Committee met June 7. Discussed rekeying the building for better control of keys and security. Made a motion to approve Tanya Juhasz contract from June 1, 2017, to June 31, 2018, with the same terms as previous contract.
- Approved a retired chief's badge for Chief Hopp with the city paying the cost of \$175.
- The Finance Committee tabled, for further study, a request by Motley Fitness to relocate the kitchen and a request to carpet the old school library.
- Approved building permits under \$5,000: Dennis Wogemuth, 1995 Knight Street, construction of a new pool deck and Jerry Bay, 1295 Knight Street, roofing application.
- Approved the purchase of grass seed for \$600 for the new sidewalk project. This will result in a reduction in the cost of the project and save the city about \$7,000 in costs.
- The council is to review a Nauvoo Business Incubator Packet for the old grade school building, which includes a Business Resource Guide, Business Incubator General Guidelines, a Utility Pricing Guide for space, a basic outline of a Business Plan, and an Application for Space.
- Approved Melissa Smith be appointed liaison to work with new and current tenants in the old grade school building.
- Hearings for a zoning change and variance will be July 24, July 31, August 7, and August 8, at 7 p.m.
- The city has received a tax bill on the old school in the amount of \$577.34 which represents the rental space to three tenants. The Finance Committee will follow up on this with the assessor as to the valuation used in making this determination. This information should be available in July or August 2017.
- Tabled action on Vicki Andrus's Splash Pad in the city park or other location.

Keep Our Children Safe

On July 19, approximately 35 people came to the civic center to hear Jessica Bolton, Children's Advocacy Center, talk about child abuse. The Center's mission is to protect and uphold the rights and provide for the safety of children when wrongs have been committed against them. She detailed how abuse can be recognized and noted that the 7 to 13-year-old age group is most preyed upon.

Besides detailing types of abuse and reasons for it, Jessica stressed the importance of adults listening carefully to what children are telling them, believing what they say, and report it to authorities. Mike Boley, Nauvoo deputy, assisted Jessica in the presentation, and both noted that sixty per cent of children abused never disclose it to anyone. When they do, it often goes unreported to authorities. Mike indicated that there are between 25-30 cases of reported child abuse cases in Hancock County yearly. These cases are thoroughly vetted according to Illinois law.

"Happy Bear" - the name of the main character in a play presented to children to teach personal safety - presentations are available for children in schools, churches, daycares, children's clubs or parent organizations. To schedule a Happy Bear presentation or a presentation on abuse prevention for teachers and parents, contact Jessica Bolton at the Advocacy Network for Children at (217) 223-2272 or (217) 617-5347. The Midwest Regional Children's Advocacy Center receives its funding from the Office of Juvenile Justice, Delinquency, and Prevention.

City Cemetery Update

City Hall, along with several public officials, were questioned recently regarding the disappearance of the floral and memorial arrangements at the City Cemetery. All the displays were gone and people wanted answers. The dreaded thought that this could be an act of vandalism started to surface. We found out what happened and, thankfully, vandalism was not the reason.

This was an unfortunate action performed by the company mowing the cemetery this year. After years of having the property mowed by one company, they were unable to continue this year, so, we solicited bids for a new contractor. The contractor has experience with other cemeteries and has good references, but, as with everything he also has a different way of approaching his job. When he was contacted, he informed us that he had hired the services of an individual who was to help him with cleaning of the displays that were laying in the grass around the headstones. He was left unsupervised and the person removed everything.

We are deeply sorry this happened, but, are thankful it wasn't an act of vandalism. The City has a policy dealing with flowers at the cemetery and City officials will look into this to see if it needs any additional information. All future mowing contractors will receive a copy of the policy.

Illinois Tourism News



The Illinois Office of Tourism announced domestic and international travel expenditures reached \$37.9 billion in 2016 – a \$571 million increase from 2015. This follows the state’s record-breaking domestic Illinois tourism figures

released in May, which highlighted an increase of one million travelers to the state in 2016.

Adams, Hancock and Pike Counties contributed to Illinois’ robust economic domestic growth, to the tune of \$157.14 million in travel expenditures (a 6.7% increase) and \$5.14 million in local tax revenue (a 20.6% increase). Additionally, the tourism industry created 10,000 new jobs across the state, with 1,070 of them in our tri-county area.

“One of the beautiful things about Illinois is the variety of experiences you can enjoy across the state – whether you’re looking for family-friendly activities, outdoor adventure, delicious food or an amazing road trip,” said Cory Jobe, Director of the Illinois Office of Tourism. “By bringing new money to our stores, hotels and attractions, visitors have the power to create a tangible economic impact for our communities. Our success as a state depends on each county doing their part to promote the diverse ways visitors can experience their own amazing moments in Illinois.”

Economic impact of domestic travel by county:

Adams: travel expenditures – \$101.89 million (1.2% increase);

local tax revenue – \$2.68 million (5.8% increase)

Hancock: travel expenditures – \$ 28.12 million (4% increase);

local tax revenue – \$1.08 million (8.7% increase)

Pike: travel expenditures – \$ 27.13 million (1.5% increase);

local tax revenue – \$1.38 million (6.1% increase)

According to Holly Cain, Executive Director of the Quincy Area CVB, our three counties have a lot to be proud of and have an exciting future ahead as work continues developing the region and impacting local communities. “Several factors are at work contributing to the continued increase in travel to our area, including lower fuel costs to distinctive, drivable destinations like we offer. Travelers are seeking an experience unique to the locale they’re visiting, whether it is the food, the people, the attractions.

Fast facts about Illinois Tourism in 2016:

- Every \$1 invested in Illinois tourism generates \$9 in economic impact
- Illinois welcomed 110 million domestic visitors (an additional one million visitors over 2015)
- Of Illinois’ 110 million domestic visitors, 17% were for business and 83% for leisure
- In the past 10 years, domestic travel to Illinois has increased by 19 million visitors
- Domestic travelers spent nearly \$35.1 billion in Illinois during 2016, a 1.8% increase over 2015
- In 2016, domestic travelers to Illinois generated \$2.6 billion in state and local tax revenue, an increase of \$122 million over 2015
- Length of stay per visitor increased by 3%, surpassing the US average of 2.4%

These numbers, provided by the U.S. Travel Association, are preliminary numbers only. Final visitor statistics will be made available later this year.

Meet Mark and Tom



Eight-year-old Mark and seven-year-old Tom are two of twenty draft horses: 5 Belgian and 15 French Percheron that can be seen pulling wagonloads of tourists through the historic area on the flats. They are four-years-old and already broken and trained to pull when they are purchased from the Amish in Bloomfield, Iowa. They

are “in harness” until they are 17 when they are sold at auction at either Kalona or Waverly, Iowa or to private parties.

The Belgians are usually sorrel (red) with flaxen manes; the Percherons, black with white. All weigh in at 2,000 pounds each and, with a “hand” being four inches, stand 16 to 18 hands (over six feet) at the withers, or neck.

Sixteen teamsters care for the horses, among them a horse-shoer, or “farrier,” and a veterinarian. And, they get great care! They get brushed and curried daily before being harnessed and, again, when the work day is over. On hot days, they even get a misted spray shower! The farrier changes their shoes and grooms their feet every six weeks in the summer and every eight weeks in the fall, and the vet sees that they are in tip-top shape.

When not on duty, they hang out in the pasture - usually standing with their team mates—eating, resting, or giving each other a playful nip. When grazing or in harness, they make an imposing picture.

The teamsters respect their horses who have a job to do, and the horses oblige while fulfilling our nostalgic need of hearing the clop clopping of hooves and the occasional nicker or snort as visitors take in the sites of historic Nauvoo. How different the experience would be if pulled by a tractor!


